An **adverb** is a single word that describes how a verb happens

Use the **-ly** suffix to write adverbs of manner (how adverbs):

slowly

happily

carefully

suddenly

gently

greedily

I **carefully** cut the paper.

I cut the paper **carefully**.

**Carefully** cut the paper.

# Year 3 Adverbs

An **adverb** is a single word that describes how a verb happens

Use the -ly suffix to write adverbs of manner (how adverbs):

slowly      happily      carefully  
suddenly      gently      greedily

Use **as...as** and **like** to create a simile:

I **carefully** cut the paper.

He ticked **like an old clock**.

I cut the paper **carefully**.

She understood **as clear as crystal**.

**Carefully** cut the paper.

An adverb is a single word that describes how, when or where a verb happens:

Adverbs of time (when) and place (where)

Time:

still      again      soon      tomorrow      today

Place:

here      there      home      left      south      upstairs

still	here	quickly
again	there	greedily
soon	home	frantically
tomorrow	left	vivaciously
today	south	wearily
	upstairs

# Year 2 Adverbial Phrases

An adverbial phrase is a group of words that adds time (when), place (where) or manner (how) to a verb.

**Fronted Adverbials can be an adverb or an adverbial phrase:**

**In the morning** the birds sang.

**High in the sky** the birds sang.

# Year 3 and 4 Adverbial Phrases

An adverbial phrase is a group of words that adds time (when), place (where) or manner (how) to a verb.

Fronted Adverbials can be an adverb or an adverbial phrase but do not forget your comma:

In the morning, the birds sang.

High in the sky, the birds sang.

As quiet as a mouse, the boy managed to reach the front door.
